Barney's Blog

I'm writing from the Hollywood of Spain.

This week I'm visiting Almeria in Andalusia, which is the Hollywood of Spain. Almeria is the location for many films and TV series. In the past, film makers chose the magnificent Tabernas Desert as a place to film classic spaghetti westerns like *A Fistful of Dollars*. And I can see why! The rock formations and dry landscape in the Tabernas Desert are very similar to the deserts of the American West. Current film makers also use the desert landscape in Almeria. The TV series *Game of Thrones* and films like *Exodus: Gods and Kings* and *Assassin's Creed* feature the Tabernas Desert.

However, film makers don't always come to Almeria for the desert. They sometimes use the Alcazaba in the city of Almeria as a place to film. *Game of Thrones* (again) and *Wonder Woman 1984* have scenes that take place in the Alcazaba. The Moors built this large fortress about 1,000 years ago. It is on a hill with views over the sea. The Moors could see ships going in and out of the port so they would know if there was any danger. It is really worth visiting because it is a fantastic site – and an ideal film set.

I'm a film lover, so I'm really enjoying my visit to Almeria. It has plenty of spectacular film locations to see. I really recommend a visit.

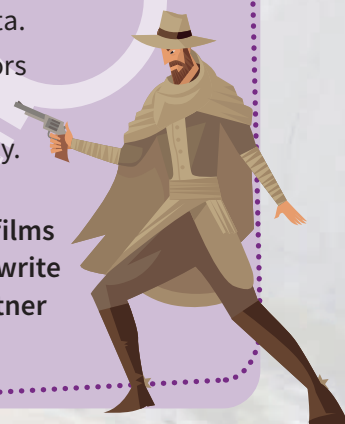

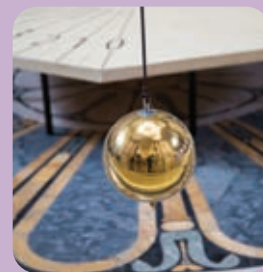

The Granada Science Park Museum

The Science Park Museum is outside the city of Granada. It opened in 1995 and was Andalusia's first interactive museum. It's really big – over 70,000 square metres. The interactive exhibitions are all about science and the world around us. There are seven permanent exhibition halls, and also many exhibits in the large park and garden area.

It was rainy on the day we were there, but it didn't matter. There were lots of indoor activities to enjoy. My favourite part was the Digital Planetarium because I'm very interested in astronomy. There were 110 different projectors to show over 7,000 stars on the digital sky.

Another really fascinating part was the Journey into the Human Body in the Macroscopio Building. There were interactive exhibits where we learned a lot about human and animal bodies and the origins of humans. For example, I found out that 60% of my body is water – amazing!

After leaving the exhibition halls we went to the tropical butterfly house, where there were 20 different species of butterflies. We also climbed the observation tower to get a fantastic view of Granada and the Sierra Nevada.

It was a great day out. The only disappointing thing was that there wasn't enough time to see everything. I think you need at least two days to see the whole park! And if you want a guided tour, you need to book at least two months in advance.

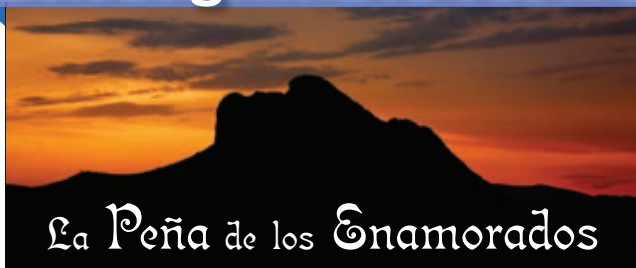

The legend of Lovers' Rock



La Peña de los Enamorados

The enormous 880m-high rock that overlooks the town and valley of Antequera is known as *La Peña de los Enamorados*, or Lovers' Rock. The name comes from a local legend.

This legend is a story of forbidden love, dating back to the 15th century, when Moors and Christians were fighting for control of the region. The lovers were the beautiful Moorish Princess Tazgona and a young Christian soldier called Tello, who was a prisoner of her father in Archidona.

One day, when Tazgona was visiting the prisoners, she saw the handsome Tello and they immediately fell in love. But unfortunately, their love was an impossible one. Their families were enemies, and Tazgona's father

had promised that she was going to marry another man. Tazgona and Tello were planning to run away when Tazgona's father discovered their plan. They escaped from Archidona, but a group of soldiers followed them.

The lovers came to a rocky mountain and decided to climb up. But when they got to the top of the rock, they could see that the soldiers were getting closer and closer. They realised that there was nowhere else for them to go. Rather than live without each other, they chose to jump over the edge, holding hands – together till the end.

Today the unusual-looking rock is notable, not only because of the story, but because it has the profile of a human head lying down. This gives the rock its other name: The Sleeping Giant. It is an impressive landmark with a romantic story – the legend of Tello and Tazgona, the two young lovers.

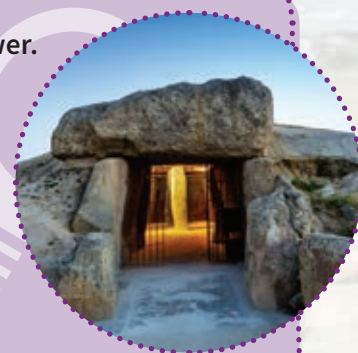

Shopping in Andalusia

Where are the best places to go shopping in Andalusia?

I love going to *La Cañada* mall in Marbella. It has the biggest variety of shops in the area, with shops for fashion, food, books and electronics. Things are sometimes more expensive here than in other shops. But with views of the sea from the terrace, this is the nicest mall I know. Just avoid Saturdays, when there are too many people. ★★★★★

You must go to *El Mercadillo del Jueves* in Seville. It's on every Thursday and it's the oldest market in Seville — it originally opened in the 13th century. As well as antique furniture, you can find ceramics, paintings, vintage fashion and second-hand books there. You never know what bargains you're going to find. ★★★★★

Don't miss *Abuela Ili Chocolate* in Pampaneira. The shop is family-owned and they make the chocolates right there in the same building. You can taste many of the chocolates and they have some really unusual flavours. The best one for me was the pepper chocolate (yes, really!). ★★★★★

Love flamenco? Then visit *El Rocio* in Granada. In this shop you can find lots of flamenco dresses in different colours, and they sell jewellery, shoes, shawls and flower decorations for your hair. They also have boots and jackets for men and children. ★★★★★

Book lovers mustn't miss *Casa del Libro* in Seville. There are four floors, so it's bigger than most bookshops, and they have books in many languages. There is also a big section with guidebooks and maps for the local area. ★★★★★

Australia experienced massive and devastating forest fires in the summer of 2019–2020. The smoke reached Buenos Aires in Argentina, 12,000 kilometres away.

FOREST FIRES IN ANDALUSIA



The last ten years have seen terrible forest fires in Andalusia. The worst two years were 2015 and 2017, when forest fires burnt more than 10,000 hectares of land. As well as destroying nature, forest fires also put people in great danger. One reason for the increase in fires is the high temperatures. Fifty percent of the highest temperatures ever recorded in Spain were all in the last ten years and all of them were in Andalusia. In July 2017, the temperature in Cordoba reached 47°, a record for Spain.

Strong winds and dry vegetation make fires worse and firefighting in these conditions is very dangerous. Helicopters drop water on the fires. They also carry firefighters into remote areas so they can reach the fires quickly. But many people have to evacuate their homes because it is too dangerous to stay.

The fire service gives advice to people living near forests and says that planning and preparation are very important. If you follow this advice, you will protect your family and, if possible, your home.

- You should keep a safe area around your house to try to stop the fire from reaching it. In the safe area there shouldn't be any dry grass and leaves. This will keep your house safer.
- Your family should have an emergency plan and you should have an agreed place to meet.
- You should have an evacuation pack ready to take with you.

And if you see a fire, call 112 immediately. Then close all the doors and windows and follow your emergency plan.

Make ICT Your Future: FAQs

1

Make ICT Your Future (*Haz TIC en tu Futuro*) is a programme for secondary school students in Andalusia and it offers activities that focus on new technologies. It has taken place every year since 2017.

2

The programme aims to get more young people, especially girls, interested in STEM subjects (science, technology, engineering and maths) and to encourage them to think about getting a job in these areas in the future.

3

At the moment, there is a big difference between the numbers of girls and boys who study STEM subjects and between the numbers of men and women who work in ICT. Only 24 out of every 1,000 women in Europe are graduates in ICT, so we need to increase this number to create more opportunities for girls and women. In the future, there will be many more jobs that focus on ICT and STEM subjects and if girls are not prepared, they might not be able to get good jobs.

4

Each year, Andalusian students have done a different activity related to technology. They have used Scratch to create animations, or they have made videos to explain their idea of a future job in ICT. Some have written blog posts about why both girls and boys need to learn programming, and others have learned how to create their own video games.

There have been winners from all over Andalusia, including students from schools in Huerca-Olvera, Aljaraque, Carmona and Baza y Vera, who have all won tablets.

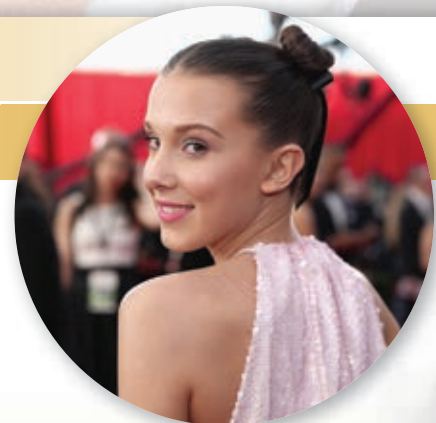
From Marbella to Hollywood

Millie Bobby Brown has lived in the UK and the USA, but did you know that this young star is actually from Malaga?

Millie was born in Marbella in 2004 and lived in Andalusia until she was four years old. She enjoyed life in the sun, playing on the beach, wearing her flamenco dress and showing off.
